UNITED STATES

- **Scrubs:** Nurses, doctors, and other medical personnel usually wear scrubs.
- **Identification Badges:** Staff must wear visible ID badges with their name and role clearly displayed.
- **Footwear:** Comfortable, closed-toe, and slip-resistant shoes are required.
- **Infection Control:** Uniforms should not be worn outside of the hospital to reduce the risk of infection.
- **Jewelry:** Limited jewelry is allowed, with rings, watches, and bracelets often discouraged in clinical areas due to infection risks.
 - **Hair and Nails:** Hair should be tied back, and nails should be kept short and clean.

Color-Coded Uniforms: The National Health Service (NHS) in the UK often uses a color-coded system for uniforms to differentiate between roles (e.g., nurses, doctors, healthcare assistants).

- **Bare Below the Elbows:** This is a common rule to prevent contamination.
- **Footwear:** Like in the US, closed-toe, slip-resistant shoes are mandatory for staff working in clinical areas.
- **Hair and Nails:** Hair should be tied up, and long or artificial nails are prohibited.
- **Infection Control:** Uniforms should not be worn outside the hospital.
